

Firefighter of the 1st Quarter 2018

The Wilmington fire Department's Kiwanis Firefighter of the First Quarter for 2018 is Captain Gordon Davis.

Approximately one year ago, Captain Gordon Davis approached the Fire Administration to develop a Squad School. The Squad School's main mission was to train in a multitude of technical rescue disciplines which would ultimately enhance our operations. After numerous discussions with the Training Unit and with the approval of the Chief of Fire, a plan for the delivery of the Squad School was developed and initiated. The program was a year in length and over 70 Firefighters participated. All the Firefighters, once completing the core courses, would be able to test and attain national certifications. Captain Davis saw the need to enhance our training and worked tirelessly throughout the year delivering the core courses:

- Rope Rescue
- High Angle Rescue
- Confined Space Rescue
- Basic Water Rescue
- Swift Water Rescue
- Advanced Vehicle Rescue and Machinery Rescue

Captain Davis dedicated numerous hours on-duty and offduty delivering the above mentioned courses. Throughout his career, Captain Davis has always had the best interest of the Wilmington Fire Department as his top priority. Captain Davis epitomizes what Firefighters should strive to achieve.

Senior Corporal Thomas J. Murphy, Jr.

Senior Corporal Thomas J. Murphy, Jr. was hired as a Cardiac Rescue Technician in December 1981. Tom completed his paramedic education through the Medical Center of Delaware Paramedic Training



Program in October of 1984. He was promoted to Corporal in 2004, and in 2017 was promoted to Senior Corporal.

Senior Corporal Murphy has been a member of the Uniform Design Committee, Vehicle Design Committee, the EMS for Children Grant Research Group, and the State of Delaware Office of EMS Paramedic Advisory Committee.

Beyond involvement in work groups, Senior Corporal Murphy has been a CPR instructor, ACLS (Advanced Cardiac Life Support) Instructor and a Field Preceptor/Field Training Officer since 1990.

Senior Corporal Thomas J. Murphy, Jr. graduated Summa Cum Laude in 2008 with a degree in Emergency Services Management from Delaware Technical and Community College.

Senior Corporal Thomas J. Murphy, Jr. is currently the longest serving EMS Division employee with over thirty-six (36) years of service, and is the longest serving active field provider (paramedic). Senior Corporal Murphy is the last member of the first paramedic training class to achieve the National Registered certificate in Delaware.

Senior Corporal Murphy's length of service is noted, but it is his long history of contribution and excellence in service that is commendable. During his career beginning in 1981, Thomas has been a member of the Uniform Design Committee, Vehicle Design Committee, EMS for Children Grant Research Group, and the State of Delaware Office of EMS Paramedic Advisory Committee.

Beyond involvement in these work groups, Senior Corporal Murphy has been a CPR Instructor and ACLS (Advanced Cardiac Life Support) Instructor. Most importantly, Tom has been a Field Preceptor/Field Training Officer since 1990. Passing his skills, insight of experience and knowledge to the new generation of New Castle County paramedics, which is invaluable!

Tom has risen through the ranks. Hired as a Cardiac Rescue Technician in 1981, he completed his paramedic education through the then, Medical Center of Delaware Paramedic Training Program in October of 1984. He was promoted to Corporal in 2004, when the EMS Division established the Career Development Plan with expanded rank structure; and in 2017 was promoted to Senior Corporal.
